BEHIND THE SCENES AT THE MUSEUM IN JANUARY AND FEBRUARY 2023:

- A PRICELESS DONATON TO OUR MUSEUM: In January, we received a Historical Society's dream: boxes of well preserved and well organized Westbrook records with dates as early as 1773. The materials were donated by Leighton Lee, III and had been housed at the Museum of Early Engineering Technology on South Main Street, a building he recently donated to the town. Many of the items relate to the history of David Bushnell, the Westbrook resident who famously invented the first submarine, the American Turtle. Other topics are included too. One is titled "The Descendants of Westbrook Settlers," a group founded in the 1919. Archivist Sandra Forest is leading the accessioning and scanning project to record all of these items into our museum's records. Volunteers Suzanne LePage and Karen Conkey have been doing the careful scanning. These records are available for viewing and research at our Historical Society.
- **PHOTOS OF OUR MUSEUM'S OBJECTS:** Our Vice President Nile Barret has been leading the project to photograph objects in our museum for our records, a valuable step in preserving our collections for the future.
- A NEW SPEAKER SYSTEM: We have also secured a new portable speaker, with microphone, which can be used outside and in.
- **GRANTS! Connecticut Humanities** has granted us \$5,000 to support our 2023 programs and events. **Essex Savings Bank** has made us an eligible organization in their annual Community Investment Program, which allows their account holders to choose a non-profit for a slice of the bank's annual contributions.
