

WESTBROOK CEMETERIES

Westbrook has four cemeteries, whose names are often confusing to even the best town historians.

Old Burying Ground: Corner of Old Clinton Road and Boston Post Road, across from the Westbrook Congregational Church.

- Circa 1739, not used anymore.
- Has Westbrook's earliest graves including veterans from the 1754-1763 French & Indian War, Revolutionary War, and War of 1812.
- Final resting places for those families who were a part of Westbrook's early history, including Bushnell, Chapman, Kelsey, Lay, Murdock, Post, Spencer, Stannard.

Lower Cemetery: South Main Street, next to St. Paul's Episcopal Church. (Not close to the Upper Cemeteries)

- Circa 1835, not used anymore.
- Burial ground for veterans of the Revolutionary War, War of 1812, and Civil War.

Cypress Cemetery: Route 153 (Essex Road) just north of the I-95 overpass. (Not to be confused with Old Saybrook's Cypress Cemetery)

- Circa mid to late 1800's, still in use today.
- Originally called Upper Cemetery and later a portion annexed and called New Upper Cemetery, now
 just called Cypress Cemetery. Still in use today.
- Over 35 Civil War veterans' graves and those who served in World War 1 to present day.

Resurrection Cemetery: 1102 Horse Hill Road.

- Burials began in early 1960's, still in use today.
- Catholic cemetery used by the Westbrook Catholic church as well as surrounding Catholic parishes.
